he Denison GLBTAA has changed its name to Denison Pride — and there's a new website to go with it — DenisonPride.com.

What's Happening With Our Denison Pride Members



Joining a crowd of 3.500+. Don Wenzel '84 (and his JP Morgan Chase PRIDE co-chair, pictured) attended the HRC National Gala on the evening of September 10 in Washington, DC. He reports it was a glittering evening packed with a long list of dignitaries and an impressive roster of speakers. Political topics were on the top of their minds, and the attendees were honored to hear from Vice Presidential candidate Tim Kaine as the keynote speaker. The evening was punctuated with remarks and performances by Billy Porter, Chad Griffin,

Samira Wiley and Nyle DiMarco. He says by far the most enthusiastic response from the crowd was to the comments of civil rights pioneer Rep. John Lewis (D, GA), who shared these words:

"When I gaze out at the crowd assembled here I see that we are one people, we are one family, we are the human family. I see everything that truly matters. I see a room filled with the light of hope, and hearts filled with simple dreams we all aspire to. We all want to gaze into the faces of the people we love and be happy; we all want to raise our families well with respect, to live and die with dignity and make a beautiful contribution while we are here....and leave some kind of legacy behind that matters. We are so much alike in every way that matters. Our similarities far outnumber our differences, but somehow we live in a society that has built a foundation on the things that separate us. We focus so much on separation, and that leads to division, and division derives hate."

Don said that Rep. Lewis emphasized these points when he commented on the Pulse tragedy in Orlando, saying, "On June 12 it was more than a man that pulled the trigger – it is the 'WHAT' that pulled the trigger; and that 'what' was a climate of hate and division. It was hate that pulled the trigger…and 49 beautiful young men and women died. That must never ever happen again in America."

Don shared that it was an honor to attend this significant gathering of LGBTQ leaders from across the county. He said it challenged him to raise the bar on both the work he does in the LGBT space while continuing to strive for a legacy of love, unity and peace.

# **Queer Studies Program Update**

The Queer Studies Committee has been working on several projects/ events during the fall of 2016. First, Queer Studies co-sponsored with

Outlook, the Department of Health, Exercise, and Sport Studies, the Black Student Union and several other campus groups the visit on October 12 of Michael Sam, the former University of Missouri football player who came out publicly as gay prior to entering the NFL draft in 2014.

Sam met with student athletes, faculty and coaches in an afternoon question-and-answer period, and then joined the Denison football team to review film of DU football. Sam also had dinner with students and faculty who represented campus organizations sponsoring his visit.

In an evening, community-wide event held in Swasey Chapel, Sam spoke movingly about his life growing up in a conservative Texas town and how his family, football, his sexuality and his public identity have shaped him as a person. Kudos to Outlook for their leadership in bringing this important event to Denison.

The QS Committee has continued work to establish learning goals for the core courses in the QS concentration, and we have just completed a faculty search for an instructor for our Queer Theory course for spring 2017, one of the three required courses for a concentration in Queer Studies.

# Way to Go, Denison DENISON

How is Denison doing in those various ratings of colleges • and universities we read about? Here are some recent recognitions and acknowledgements\*:

- A new college ranking in late October, compiled by the Washington Post, places Denison University at No. 28 in the nation for liberal arts colleges. The ranking combines five well-respected college rankings including *U.S. News* and World Report, Washington Monthly, Wall Street Journal/Times Higher Education, Forbes and Money. Denison is the highest ranked college in Ohio.
- The 2017 Fiske Guide to Colleges noted that at Denison "classes are small and individual attention is the norm." They added that the college "aims to graduate independent thinkers who become active members of a democratic society." Describing the college as a whole, Fiske writes, "Denison does a great job of crossing over and • piecing together academic interests, and they have tons of connections in the world to help you succeed after college."
- Forbes recognized Denison with positions on its "America's Top Colleges" and "Top Midwest Colleges" lists. The college also received an A+ financial rating, measuring its financial fitness.

Recognizing the excellence of Denison's liberal arts and sciences education, the Princeton Review once again placed Denison on its lists of "Best Colleges," "Colleges That Pay You Back," "Best Midwestern" and "Green Colleges."



The rankings in the 2017 edition are based on surveys of 143,000 students.

- College Raptor has named the college as the "The Best Hidden Gem College in Ohio." This recognition aims to highlight colleges and universities around the country that offer excellent educations. (College Raptor says it "is like a cheat sheet for making smarter, more affordable college choices.")
- Money magazine has recognized Denison University as No. 3 in the nation for merit aid.
